Love, acceptance and trust - the lesson of St Francis and the wolf...

(Abstract of reflection at Celebrating with All the Animals at Bedingham Church on 2 October 2022)

October 4th is the feast day St Francis of Assisi (who lived c. 1181-1226). Aptly, it's designated as World Animal Day, an international focus for animal welfare. And it's definitely a good time to celebrate here in the Hempnall Group with all our animals.

A famous story about St Francis concerns the wolf of Gubbio. Francis had heard how a large, savage wolf was terrorising the residents of this old, fortified town, making them afraid to venture beyond the city walls. Determined to investigate, he visited, talked with the inhabitants and – to their alarm – decided to confront this terrible beast.

Fearless because of his affinity with all of God's creation, Francis wandered into the countryside. Soon he heard the great howl of the wolf, which approached him with teeth bared and hackles up, ready to attack and devour. Francis made the sign of the cross and said, 'Brother wolf – come here to me, you are bad and have been harming God's creation and people. I want you to make peace and not harm anyone ever again.' The wolf, dumbfounded by this extraordinary man, bent his head and wagged his tail in submission. Then, to confirm the promise, he offered Francis his paw as a sign of understanding and commitment.

So, with the wolf by his side, Francis re-entered the city, to general amazement. He told the people that while the wolf was quite bad, they themselves were not much better; he instructed them to make reparation and a pact with the wolf, to care for him and feed him every day. They promised so to do, and again the wolf gave Francis his paw as affirmation of his good intentions for the future.

After that the wolf wandered freely around Gubbio, being fed properly and even entering people's homes. The citizens began to love and respect him and he was content, his hunger assuaged. Perhaps not only hunger for food, but his hunger to be accepted and loved. After two years the wolf died, to great

distress. He was buried in a chapel dedicated to St Francis. In 1873 workers there discovered the skull of the wolf under a stone.

We may think that this well-documented story is exaggerated – yet it has underlying truths. Francis loved all creation intensely. He was attuned to the wolf's vulnerability – fear, hunger and maybe loneliness (being without a pack). He also had great intuition with people – including the inhabitants of Gubbio, who, with their own indiscretions, needed to re-set their lives – and was able to preach about God and his love for all His creation, as we are all bound together.

Perhaps in many ways we all need taming, we all need to be loved and accepted, regardless of what has happened to us. And we all need to learn how to trust. Let us revel in all the beauty around us, all that we have, all that we love, and give thanks for those preceding us who have led us in various ways to know, to accept and to trust in the love of our merciful and great God. Amen.
