Are we listening?

Last week, in leading our service at Hempnall, Bishop David (former Bishop of Bolton and now Honorary Assistant Bishop in our Diocese) included in his sermon a reminder about how important it is to **listen** to God.

As we move into Lent, traditionally a time of Christian reflection, 'talk less and listen more' is useful advice.

Listening is not always easy. And although both Biblical Hebrew and Greek had a single word for 'listening' and 'hearing', in English we differentiate. I may ask someone 'Can you hear me?'. But I mean something different if I ask, 'Are you listening to me?'. Listening suggests something more.

This is illustrated by an often-told story about Franklin D Roosevelt (President of the USA from 1933-45) who – tired of the tedium of exchanging pleasantries in the long receiving lines at White House receptions – decided on one occasion to test whether anyone actually listened to what he said. So, as each person shook his hand, he smiled and said, 'Good evening, I murdered my Grandmother this morning.' People would automatically respond with comments like, 'O, how wonderful' and 'Keep up the good work'. It was not until the end of the line that one ambassador (said to be from Bolivia) replied differently. 'Well,' he whispered, 'I'm sure she had it coming.'

Whether true or not, the tale serves to make the point that 'listening' involves more than just hearing someone speak. It needs us to concentrate, to pay attention, to be alert and perceptive.

These are the attributes we should bring when listening – really listening – to God. And Lent is a good opportunity for all of us to try to apply and develop our 'listening - to - God' skills.



Here is a poem about listening by the late American nun, Carol Bialock:

<u>Today I Was a Little More Deliberate</u> Today I was a little more deliberate. I breathed into bitterness. I was spacious inside. I listened. So I heard the turtle expanding in her shell: I felt the earthworm and the lily bulbs embrace, waiting for the spring.

May we learn to listen well.
