A Perspective on April...

In 'The Garden', her final book of poetry published in 1946, the writer (and gardener) Vita Sackville West famously described April as 'the angel of the months, the young love of the year.' It's an arresting representation. And it's certainly a lot more complementary than the opinion of many who in various online surveys seem to regard April as 'fair to middling'...'neither one thing nor the other'.

As part of preparing to write this I checked out views of April with a random assortment of friends and acquaintances: what did the month conjure up for them? Images and memories of budding flowers and trees, spring walks – and spring cleaning – were common. (More unusual was one decisive answer I received – 'Ants!' Ants? Yes, ants awake from winter slumber at this time of year and can already start to be a nuisance...).

What struck me was that hardly anyone said 'Easter' – whereas if asked a similar question about December most would probably refer in some way to 'Christmas'.

Now, of course, that's at least in part because Easter has always been a moveable feast. Determining a date for it was a matter of major controversy in the early church and even after agreement was reached in the C4th CE (ie that it should be on the Sunday after the first full moon following the Spring equinox) there was further fine tuning of the calculations. The Eastern Orthodox Church uses a different calendar and its Easter is later - but the effect for Roman Catholics and Protestants is that Easter can fall on any Sunday between 22 March and 25 April, depending on lunar cycles. In practice, more often than not, it's in April (19th April being the most frequent date – this year it's on the 20th). But it's not associated with a month in the same way as Christmas is.

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Nor its celebration embedded. Easter to many people is about chocolate and bank holidays – both things that are enjoyed, certainly – but with even less appreciation of a Christian dimension than is the case with Christmas. Perhaps that's because the concepts of Easter are less readily understood. The birth of Jesus as a special child is somehow easier to talk about and to grasp than the significance of his subsequent death and resurrection. Yet for us as Christians the events of Easter are at the core of our faith and it's our most important festival. After all it's only because of Easter that we mark Christmas.

So in the coming month, when Easter once again falls in April, let's recognise and try to meet a challenge: let's try to think through for ourselves what Easter means for us and seek to share that with someone else, to whom this might be quite new. Perhaps in future, when looking back – and when looking ahead – they might then be able to say, 'Ah yes, April 2025; that's when I found out about Easter...
