Edith Cavell Nurse and Inspiration A National Heroine

I was looking through my bookshelves in search of one on the Lincolnshire Wolds Way when I came across a leaflet for The Edith Cavell Pilgrimage. I must have picked it up a few years ago, intending to walk it, but I think Covid got in the way and the leaflet got put to one side. It is now top of my list of things to do, walking from Swardeston to Norwich Cathedral on the Edith Cavell Pilgrimage. I also found the leaflet interesting as I did not know much about Edith Cavell. Reading through it, I saw that it was in August 1914, in Britain, that she heard of the



threat of the German invasion of neutral Belgium, where she worked as matron in Brussels first nursing school, L'École Belge d'Infirmières Diplômées. She immediately travelled back to Brussels to be with her nurses where they cared for casualties regardless of national origin.

She was born in Swardeston the eldest child of the vicar. It is said that as there were few opportunities for young women of her background, she wrote "Someday, somehow, I am going to do something useful, I don't know what it will be, I only know that it will be something for people". She trained as a nurse in London and in 1907 was invited by Belgium's leading surgeon, Antoine Depage, to become the founding director of the first professional nurses training school in Belgium. She came home each summer to Norfolk for a holiday.

Back in Belgium, in early 1915, Edith became part of an underground network to help those caught behind enemy lines, to escape. Knowing that if she was caught it would probably mean a death sentence. She was eventually arrested and imprisoned, kept in solitary confinement, and then tried and found guilty of treason. She was executed by firing squad on 12th October 1915. Edith faced death with calm courage "I have no fear or shrinking. I have seen death so often, it is not strange or fearful to me" she wrote.

Her body was returned to England in May 1919 and after a state funeral in Westminster Abbey as befits a heroine, her body was brought back home to Norfolk and is buried in the grounds of the Cathedral.

May I suggest that you consider undertaking the pilgrimage from Swardeston to Norwich and use it to reflect on Edith's selfless life in service to others, and how your own life measures up to that, the commitment and practice of her Christian principles.

Pilgrimages and walks are a good time for self-examination as well as relaxing and enjoyable.

From the book of Common prayer:

Living God, the source of all healing and wholeness: we bless you for the compassionate witness of your servant Edith Cavell. Inspire us to be agents of peace and reconciliation in a world beset by injustice, poverty, and war. We ask this through Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, to the ages of ages. Amen.
