## "A city set on a hill cannot be hidden" ......

This line from Jesus' teaching in the Sermon on the Mount may not at first glance seem particularly seasonal. Recent events, however, suggest to me that while we are busy with all the normal December activities leading up to Christmas there are other issues that also demand our attention.



Our Church is under scrutiny as never before. The publishing of the Makin report and subsequent resignation of Archbishop Justin seem unfortunately to be only the latest in a never-ending series of negative media coverage. If it's not abuse and the way its victims have been treated, it's same sex relationships or reparation for the historical wrongs of slavery.

"A city set on a hill". When Jesus used that metaphor, he was not referring to the built structures of his day but to the quality of spiritual leadership of his people. It was the beginnings of the challenge that Jesus made to the "scribes and Pharisees" (a phrase which is shorthand for the religious leaders of the day) to live out more fully, more compassionately, God's laws which they claimed to uphold but so often seemed to fall short of. Our own church has some big questions to face up to in its status as a "City set on a hill", a light to shine before others, and in no area more than that of safeguarding.

Of course this is not the whole picture. At its best the Church continues to be a place of sanctuary and safety, of care and compassion, of loving service to the community and especially to the poorest and most vulnerable. Christians are among the most active in voluntary work and community service and while the senior leadership of the Church clearly failed so many in the past, there is a sense that we are at least beginning to put our house in order. We have promised to devote the appropriate level of resources to ensuring that we can be better, that we can bear scrutiny. Without it detracting from the joyousness of the season, let's all keep safeguarding in the forefront of our minds. Find out who the contacts are at diocese, benefice or parish level. They are all there and

very willing to respond. Undertake the training available, there's nothing to fear from it! Never be afraid to act on concerns for someone.

The good news is that while we have a lot to repent and a lot to live up to, we are not imprisoned by the past. We can learn from the past but must inhabit the future in which Christ's love, grace and strength are the abiding marks of the Church.

A city set on a hill cannot be hidden.
