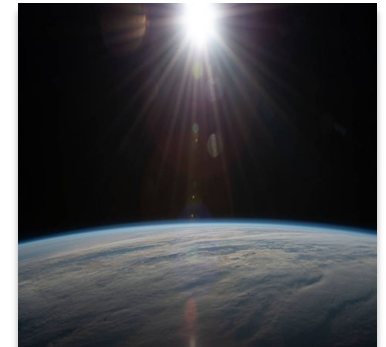


The Brooke Benefice and The Hempnall Group Thoughts and Prayers January 2026

A great light ...

The Gospel readings for January, during the successive Sundays of Epiphany ('manifestation'), relate various ways in which Christ's glory became apparent and was recognised by others in his early life.

In our celebration of Epiphany itself at the start of the month we note the expectation and persistence of the Wise Men in following the star to Jesus and of their readiness to express wonder and to worship when they found him.



Moving on, we hear of John the Baptist's recognition of the significance of Jesus on the occasion of his (adult) baptism and how, shortly afterwards, the first disciples responded to Jesus's invitation to 'Come and see'.

That theme is further pursued in the Gospel reading at the end of the month from Matthew (Matt 4:12-23) about Jesus's early ministry, with the Gospel writer referencing Isaiah (Isa 9:1-4):

*'The people who walked in darkness
have seen a great light';
those who lived in a land of great darkness –
on them light has shined.'*

During Epiphanytide, then, we're encouraged to think about how we've been brought to know Jesus, about how we recognise and acknowledge him. What does the 'great light' mean for us? How can we make others aware of it?

This point is addressed in a lovely poem – which Trixie Dye shared with us in a Zoom service some time ago – by the late Rev Kathy Galloway, a Church of Scotland minister and former Leader of the Iona Community (who, sadly, died this summer):

*The sky does it simply, naturally
day by day
the sun does it joyfully
like someone in love
like a runner on the starting-line
the sky, the sun,
they just can't help themselves
no grand speeches
but everyone sees, and is happy with them.*

*Make us like that Lord
so that faith is not in our words but in our lives
not in what we say, but in who we are
passing on your love like an infectious laugh:
not worried, not threatening, just shining
like the sun, like a starry night,
like a lamp-stand,
light for life -
your light for our lives.*

Let's pray in the month ahead that we, too, may shine.
