Reflection

Ordinary Time...

As we move into June, we are about to experience (after Trinity Sunday) a long period of so-called 'Ordinary Time' in the Church calendar.

The Christian year – with an annual sequence of festivals and seasons, interspersed with saints' days and some locally determined community commemorations – has had a long gestation. Its origins in the early church were unplanned and unco-ordinated, its early development largely organic, growing out of the faith practices of Christian communities over several centuries and in disparate geographical areas, with intermittent 'top-down' authorisation from Church authorities.

The resulting Church calendar is not just a dry schedule of dates. As we now have it, the year provides a sequence of opportunities to 'show and tell', in a coherent way, to ourselves and others, the essentials of the Christian story. In driving the liturgy through which we participate in worship, and with major festivals broadly (though not precisely) following the chronology of Christ's life, the calendar gives a synopsis of events, and, through them, of concepts and beliefs, that define us. Its celebration connects us to other Christians, past and present: it promotes identity.

Each part of the year, each season, gives us a different perspective. And 'Ordinary Time' is no exception. Deriving from the Latin 'ordinalis', which refers to numbers in a sequence and conveys a sense of being 'in order', the name in English is unfortunate: it sounds negative or boring. But it definitely need not be. It gives space for more continuous reading from the Bible (especially in this 'Year A' from Matthew) and allows time to explore other themes such as creation and the environment. There are many opportunities to take stock, to reflect, to learn and to grow.

This year especially, as we progress with the formation of our 'new benefice' and move to different service patterns, June will, in any case, seem anything but routine. It will be challenging. But we have in this 'Ordinary Time' ahead of us the opportunity to participate together in making something 'extraordinary'. Let's pray for God's guidance as we seek to do that:

May we treasure the past with thanksgiving, May we embrace the future with hope, May we journey ahead with confidence
