

Thought for the month...

The winter has passed and as I look out of my window the apple trees are full of blossom; the blackbirds are looking for nesting material and there is a feeling of hope as I look forward to summer. However, as I look forward it is also with a sense of sadness as I think of the summers spent as a child and a teenager with my parents. Summer holidays enjoying the sandy beaches in Norfolk or the views



of hills in Wales, the days out to the zoo or just helping in the garden. These are very fond memories that will always be with me. My parents are no longer with us but the memory lives on. My thoughts this month are also of a number of friends and family who are no longer with us or are seriously ill. It is at times like this that there can be challenges to our faith – why has God let this happen? The readings for Good Friday, which were read on our benefice pilgrimage, gave me some comfort, even Jesus on the cross cries out "My God why have you forsaken me?". And then there is the question, what is after death? In the funeral service I use the following in prayer "In your mercy turn the darkness of death into the dawn of new life, and the sorrow of parting into the joy of heaven". In thinking about the loss of a loved one I have found the poem 'Crossing the Bar' by Alfred Lord Tennyson helpful. It presents the journey from life into death as if calmly advancing into a new phase. It is like seeing a ship sailing away and as it disappears over the horizon, it is still there, in another place.
