In the comfort and security of technologically advanced Britain it's easy to forget how the lives of our ancestors were totally dependent on working with the seasons. Farmers must still do things at the correct time but even that is helped by the speed and efficiency of modern machinery. The Anglo-Saxon name for the month of October was Winterfylleth. This



translates as "winter full moon" and was so called because they held that winter started on the full moon, Hunter's moon, of that month.

To us winter may involve a certain amount of discomfort, of inconvenience, of gloom, but to these people it could actually be a matter of life and death. The question that must have always been on their minds in October was "are we ready?" Is there enough wood cut to keep warm? Is there sufficient food stored to eat?
