## Happy Places...

What and where are our 'happy places'? What locations, or circumstances, or activities bring us such joy and contentment that even thinking of them, in memory or in prospect, is sufficient to make us feel happy and relaxed? Here's a 'thumbnail' picture of one of mine – walking with my dog, Ripple, sharing her evident sense of pleasure and adventure at being out and about.

It's only in the past 30 years or so that the 'happy place' phrase, now so common, has been in general use, with the

Oxford English Dictionary attributing its first appearance in print to an article in *The Ottawa Citizen* in 1994. Of course, the search for happiness is not new: the philosophers of ancient Greece, including Plato and Aristotle, were exploring it well over 2,000 years ago and its pursuit has remained a constant human endeavour. Now, however, identifying our 'happy place' is mainstream, linked with concepts of well-being and mindfulness which aren't restricted just to New Age practitioners of meditation but are part of the general cultural landscape.

Whatever our individual triggers for happiness, an extra dimension for us as Christians is to consider where and how our faith plays into this. It may impact some of our choices but more fundamentally it may cause us to rephrase the question. If we ask ourselves, 'Where do we find God?', how do our answers to that question compare with any mental list we've made of our 'happy places'? Are they the same? If they're different, can we work out why?

Of course, I'm not saying that we only seek or find God when we're happy or that happiness is the only emotion involved in the relationship we have or would like to have with God. But I am suggesting that if we do indeed find apparently secular 'happy places' – be they a favourite landscape or our garden or knitting or dancing – we should actively seek to acknowledge, with gratitude, God's presence there with us as we enjoy them, whatever and wherever they are.

And since as Christians we believe that God's presence is all around us, perhaps we need to work a little on our attentiveness, so that we recognise and experience more readily and more fully God's closeness and activity, expanding as we do so our personal range of 'happy places'. Let's pray that, through God's grace, we're enabled to do that.
