

Keep your balance...

I have always loved this time of year. Most of the conventional harvest has been gathered in by the farmers and in our gardens, we may still be picking fruit, vegetables and flowers. For us beekeepers the honey has been extracted and feeding of the hives to compensate for our robbing has commenced. The weather tends to be "pleasant", not too hot and not yet cold. School year begins with staff and pupils refreshed from their summer break and in many other ways plans are put in place for the coming twelve months. It may be time to move house or simply reorganise the furniture ready for the chillier time to come. We can look at what we've grown this year and put a planting scheme in place for next.

Whatever is happening I find myself reflecting on it all and thinking about the timeless rhythms of the world and the life that God has given us. Of course, I'm not the first to have thought about such things. Scripture gives us that often quoted line "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:" (Ecclesiastes 3:1).
