...the ones who worry that we may be lonely, and the ones who make sure that that does not happen. (*Pause to name them.*) Lord, draw near.

Let us hold before God... ...the ones who feed our minds and our bodies, and the ones with whom we share faith and fellowship. *(Pause to name them.)* Lord, draw near.

Let us hold before God... ...the ones who, tonight, we want to pray for, and the ones who, unasked, tonight will pray for us. *(Pause to name them.)* Lord, draw near.

Lord, draw near and hear our prayer. Amen.

Prayers for ourselves

Lord, I lay my head to rest, and in doing so, lay at your feet the faces I have seen, the voices I have heard, the words I have spoken, the service I have given, the joys I have shared, the sorrows revealed, I lay them at your feet, and in doing so lay my head to rest.

God, grant us your light this night, your grace whilst we sleep, and your joy in the morning. Lift from us any anguish, and lighten our souls in the light of your love. Jesus Christ, Son of Mary, Holy Spirit, Light of Life; shield and sustain us and all our dear ones, this night and in the nights to come. Amen

Bless to us, O God, the moon that is above us, the earth that is beneath us, the friends who are around us, the rest which is before us. **Amen.**
