

An Update from the Speedwatch Team



It is pleasing to report that the team has recruited more members. We have been active in the village but hope to be able to increase the number of

sessions. Our goal is to encourage motorists not to speed and to create awareness of the importance of observing the 30mph and 20mph limits.

This is for the benefit and safety of us all, children and adults. For example, if a pedestrian is hit by a car travelling at 25mph or 30mph, their chance of survival would be considerably greater than if the car was doing 35mph. Something to think about.

New Dog Bin

We will shortly (at the time of writing) install a new dog bin at the Mill Road end of the footpath from the Street. This is a very popular thoroughfare which now has a dog bin at each end.

Play area revamp and development



We will start work on the new play area with the provision of a zip wire and rope swing this autumn. The main "fort/slide" will be taken down shortly as the ground needs to be prepared and left to compact in order to accommodate more new equipment later.

The play area team have been successful in attracting significant third-party funding and await the outcome of some more grant applications. Thank you for doing your bit by supporting the local fun fundraising events.

Research in practice

This month I want to touch on the importance of research in primary care. I have been involved with various research studies over the past few years, and many of you would have received invites from me for these studies. I want to thank you for responding and participating in studies which include the DIFRID, StatinWISE, Orange juice study, TWICS, GRASP – AF, CANDID, Colorectal and many more. The ongoing studies at present include ATTACK, HipDys and Immune Defence Study. We are also getting involved with an Asthma diagnosis study for 5 – 25-year-olds.

What is the need for Research in Primary Care?

An article in the British Journal of General Practice in 2019 by Richard Hobbs gives us the answer we all ask ourselves. I enclose important excerpts from his article.

'Primary care evidence has regularly impacted on informing international clinical guidelines, which is itself a useful surrogate for relevance and impact. The rate of such research has accelerated in the past 20 years and the quality and complexity has increased. Health systems should highlight the importance of primary care research to help deliver and guide priorities and invest in the academics and research practice networks that provide the evidence.'

It is important that research continues. I want to again thank all of you who have participated and continue to participate. I do hope as more relevant studies come out, many more of you will participate and help improve care and management of various conditions.

The Garden in October

The autumn chill sets in

Although we had some warmer days over September, the autumn is now definitely here for real, and it feels colder. It's a beautiful time of year, with the trees changing colour. Sometimes it may seem pointless raking, when the wind blows even more leaves onto the lawn, but just think of all the lovely leafmould you can make! It's also time to start preparing for early frosts.

1. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory. In frost-prone areas a conservatory is the ideal place for overwintering tender perennials and marginally hardy plants from the garden. Cold-sensitive plants in need of good light levels and dry, frost-free conditions will also benefit.



2. Cut back perennials that have died down. Perennials are not demanding plants, but trimming them after flowering finishes in autumn helps improve their appearance and flowering. However, you can leave some stems over winter to provide homes and food for wildlife, and then trim back in spring.



3. Divide herbaceous perennials.

Dividing perennials regularly will ensure healthy, vigorous plants that will continue to perform year after year. It also offers the opportunity to multiply your plants.

- 4. Divide established rhubarb crowns to create new plants
- 5. Plant out spring cabbages
- 6. Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts



- 7. Prune climbing roses
- 8. Finish collecting seeds from the garden to sow next year
- 9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas
- 10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf

Because however many bands, speakers, and stalls are there what Greenbelt is all about is the people. A non-Christian Folk singer told me he had never been to a festival like it and that he was overwhelmed at the welcome he was given and the kindness of everybody. Every year there is a theme to Greenbelt and this year's was 'Wake Up' to what we are doing to the world and how can we combat global warming and protect the beautiful world that God has given us. But there is much more, the plight of the poor downtrodden by the rich and the evils of war.

Of everything I heard and saw it was a song that moved me to tears. Here are three of the verses:

If the war goes on and the children die of hunger, and the old men weep for the young men are no more,

and the women learn to dance without a partner who will keep the score?


If the war goes on and the rich increase their fortunes,
